In Memoriam – Mary Morrison

The Guild has lost one of its longest serving and active members: Mary Morrison, a weaver, teacher and long-time board member died on Wednesday, February 20th, 2019. Born in Alberta to an RCMP officer and his English wife, Mary spent a colourful childhood in Fort Chipewyan and Edmonton. In 1944, she moved with her family to Vancouver Island and trained there as a primary school teacher. Marriage to a serving military officer, John Morrison, ended her teaching career but led to further adventures in various locations as she raised her children.

Mary started weaving around 1968. She was an excellent weaver with a great love of vivid colour – especially red. Mary was a popular weaving instructor, teaching beginning and more advanced weaving classes. She especially enjoyed teaching classes on weaving rugs. She taught at Twin Willows, Valley Fibres and for both weaving guilds.

Mary also excelled in the many administrative functions she held in all the weaving organizations she belonged to over the years. At different times she was President of the Outaouais and the Ottawa Weavers' and Spinners' Guilds; twice in the case of the OVWSG! She was also President of Ontario Handweavers and Spinners. She was a joy to watch chairing meetings in strict adherence to Robert's Rules of Order and with no patience for fools who did not observe them.

Workshops

Not much new to report, so here is a list of workshops coming in the next 6 weeks or so that have space:

1919 Jewelry Making with Felt Sat Mar 2 and 9. This is a new one where students use wet felting techniques to make beads and cords on the first day and turn those parts into jewelry on the 2nd day. Please register by Monday Feb 25 or I may have to cancel this one.

1920 Colour Theory 1. Sun Mar 10 and 17. This is an excellent workshop for artists in any medium, though Mandy leans it towards fibre.

1921 Egg Basket Sat Mar 16 and 23. Workshops with Laurie are always fun and educational.

1922 Custom Wet Felted Hat Sun Mar 17. This workshop often has repeat attendees. I think Jan has been more than 3 times!

1924 Wet Felted Chicks and Eggs Sat Mar 23. Learn to wet felt while making a fun Easter decoration.

1927 Warp Painting with Acid Dyes - The session April 6 is full, but I am working on arranging more sessions. If you want in, go to the listing and click "get on a waiting list". Fill in the form and I will add you to the list. May 11 is one possible date, if you can make that date, put a note in the comment box on the waitlist form.

1928 Short Draw to Long Draw Sun April 7. Excellent for spreading your spinning wings and trying new techniques

1929 Wet Felted Flowers Wed Apr 10. Fun, instant gratification wet felting.

To register type the number of the workshop in the search box on any page at ovwsg.com. That will take you first to a short blurb, then click on "continue reading" to go to the listing with the registration form. PayPal/credit card is much preferred and guarantees your spot. If you get there too late and there aren't any spots left please do fill in a waitlist form. When there is sufficient interest I do try to arrange more sessions. It also helps in planning for future years. A full workshop tells me there is good interest in the topic but a long waitlist tells me I ought to run more sessions next time!

Library

A quick overview of the library

The librarians hope you are finding the new layout of the library easier to find books.

We now have almost all the magazines in the database. Now if we do a search by the catalog topic headings you will find magazines that fall best in that topic also listed. This would skew the total number of items in the topic if we count each magazine as one item so I have counted the magazine by titles separately.

We are primarily a weaving and spinning guild and have welcomed felters and basket makers. We have material in the library that supports the study of all these topics. We try to choose material that will expand the members' interest in a topic or give more information about a part of the topic. We also have topics that are beneficial to members in general: on principles of design, colour, dyeing, business, studios and guilds. Most weavers do not weave for the joy of the process of weaving and most spinners do not spin for the enjoyment of the process of spinning. So we try to have some books on topics about what to do with woven cloth after you have woven it as well as what do with yarn after you have spun it. We have information on embellishment which may be of interest to weavers, spinners, or felters and maybe even inspire the basket makers.

Not every book is in circulation each month or even each year. Many that sit patently on the shelf waiting for you are perused and consulted within the library then carefully returned to their shelf. We try to notice what is being perused as well as what is being taken out. The Library also uses the lists of interests from the registration data to help inform us which direction to expand the library. We also watch for new publications, which tend to vary from one year to another depending on the topic's level of interest and compare it to our holdings. With the consolidation of the library this will be much easier.


