equipment auction. There are amazing deals to be had!

- DO send an email to rentals@ovwsg.com anytime; we will contact you to arrange a time to pick up equipment which is convenient for both of us. Tips & Tricks

Spinners: Don't scrimp on fibre preparation

In my experience, the more time you spend preparing your fibre for spinning, the finer will be your outcome. I have grown to appreciate the processes more with time. I used to just want to spin the fleece warm from the sheep. Now I indulge and spend more time with the elements! As a benefit, you get to spend more time immersed in the raw and the straw! The only downside is that it makes it harder to part with the end product.

The Kumihimo slip-knot

A slip-knot used in Kumihimo — Japanese braiding — is very useful in other fibre arts. It lets you keep a thread taut and secure but also lets you easily play it out or take it in. In weaving, when wrapped around a weighted object — like a pill bottle containing pennies or screws — it is perfect for weighting a floating selvedge or a replacement thread.

To make a slip-knot using a weighted pill bottle:


- 1) secure one end of the thread by closing the cap over it and wind most of the thread around the bottle;
- 2) turn the bottle so the loose end of the thread is away from you and under the pill bottle;



3) place the palm of your right hand on top of the threads and tuck your thumb under them.



4) twist your right hand so that the warp threads make a loop around your fingers.



5) place the loop around the bottle and pull the loose end to tighten the knot.



The result is a V of thread through which the loose end emerges and which is secure when pulled.




To make the knot slip:

- hold the pill bottle so the point of the V of the slip knot is facing you; and
- a) to play-out more thread, turn the pill bottle towards you while pulling the loose end; or
- b) to take-up thread, loosen the V and turn the pill bottle away from you so the loose end can wind onto the bottle.



- Some new members or visitors included a Kingston guild member, one wanting to learn felting, another for blackstrap weaving, and one interested in everything we have to offer.

BUSINESS

- Natalie thanked all volunteers for both the Ex & Sale and the OC Transpo sale, along with Ann, Kelly and Judy plus those volunteers who helped set up and do demos. Volunteers for OC Transpo raised over \$10,000

Fibre Artist Hannah Ranger. Liane introduced Hannah. She has a big studio in Quebec just north of Wakefield in an old school with other artists. She works with wool, other animal fibres and plant fibres. She gets inspiration from the environment. She likes to point out the rhythms of life and nature and show respect to the natural world. Hannah has been working in fibre since 2008. Fibre migration relates to the connective qualities and structural capacities of fibres. She became interested in the colors that can come from nature. She showed the flowers and fruits she was taught to pick while in Mexico staying with a family to learn how to make the dyes.
