President's Message

June at the Guild means that it's now time to wrap up one year and begin another.

The year we're leaving behind has been one of our slowest in decades as we were in various forms of lockdown throughout the time. We managed to find new ways to serve our members, and many of us learned new skills to do so. We were able to offer equipment rentals (with distanced pickup/dropoff), library rentals (again, distanced pickup/dropoff), Monday night social (via Zoom), and three study groups: Rug Weaving led by Mandy Heggtveit, The Spinners Book of Yarn Design led by Elizabeth Watt, and Wire Armature Gauge Investigation for Needle Felting led by Jan Scott. Unfortunately, we had to cancel all our scheduled in-person classes and our annual Exhibition and Sale.

The year ahead, however, holds great promise for renewal. Thanks to grants from the New Horizons for Senior Program, we have a new 100-loom almost set up and ready to go. We have two new studio looms (a Louet Spring and a Schact Baby Wolf), four new spinning wheels (Ashford Victoria, Ashford Kiwi 3, Ashford espinner, and Hansen e-spinner), one new rigid heddle loom, a blending board, carders, electric bobbin winders (one for the Studio, one for the Classroom), and an electric ball winder. We are really looking forward to welcoming our members to Heartwood House as soon as possible.

We are planning to reopen gradually while also planning to adjust quickly for any possible changes. We will keep everything online through the summer months and evaluate when we can begin to meet in person and hold workshops in person again. We will start back slowly and may continue to offer some things online in the future. We welcome any of your feedback on this.

I'd like to thank our many volunteers this year who kept the guild going even when we didn't know what that "going" would look like! This has resulted in numerous Zoom meetings and emails as we figured things out.

Happy spinning, weaving, felting, and creating this summer. We will keep you up to date on Guild activities and look forward to seeing you all again in the fall.

Member Book Reviews

Learning to Weave by Deborah Chandler (1994) (Guild Library Call no: 4730.CHA)

This is another excellent book with a very wide-ranging scope; although I would not recommend it as a very first book, as it assumes a multi-shaft floor loom. Fully one half of the volume explains beautifully, in clear detail the theory and practice of weaving, including an explanation of looms, and tools; how interlacing creates fabric; warp and weft, etc. It then explains planning a project, calculation warp and weft and record-keeping. For someone who has never woven at all this is an excellent introduction. But after this, the author progresses to drafts with tie-up. There is not intermediate step such as plain weave with only one shaft (which would explain and demonstrate drafting) and not no draft o plain weave either. The first discussion of drafts includes tie-ups, threading and treadling with no clear explanation of what each of those are and how they are integrated. Further along, this volume also explores more complicated weaves, and more complicated concepts. If the reader is familiar with these, then the rest of the volume has loads to offer. Otherwise, other reference material will be required.

<u>The Ashford Book of Rigid Heddle Weaving</u>, by Rowena Hart (2014) (Guild Library Call no: 6714.1HAR) This is an excellent starting book; clear, easy to understand instructions and accompanying photos and illustrations. It has a huge variety of project ideas, including one chapter on 2 heddle weaving, with a project suggestion. Detailed table of contents.

Workshops

We had a successful run of the pilot Study Groups, with the Rug Weaving Group just finishing up. The 3 groups were all different in style, participants of all three groups reported that the groups met their expectations and worked well and gave us feedback to make improvements. Now what we need are more ideas and leaders. My group (spinning focus) had a few ideas but suggested that we wait until Fall to try them. Meanwhile a small group of instructors have met to discuss other possible online offerings such as workshops, "ask the expert" drop-in sessions, or private tutoring/mentoring. Input from the broader guild is welcome. What ideas do you have that we could try? When we are permitted to offer in person workshops, would you still want to see some programming online? What kinds? Why? Share your thoughts with me at workshops@wattfamily.ca.
