President's Message

I'm feeling cautiously optimistic that we will soon be able to meet in person again for small gatherings at the guild. The executive has been discussing how to open our physical space to guild members again as lockdowns are lifted. Public health measures such as vaccine mandates and masking will remain for the foreseeable future, but the light is beginning to shine again. We will continue to meet virtually for our monthly member meetings into the new year, but we are planning to hold hybrid (in-person plus online) meetings sometime in the new year.

Our first in-person workshop began this month! We are using the upstairs Classroom for these first workshops as there is more space for participants to spread out. Several more spinning and weaving workshops are scheduled for this fall — check them out in the Workshop tab on our website.

The Studio has been cleared of all the excess looms and stuff that accumulated over the past 18 months. The guild was donated several looms over the summer, and the Studio became the repository for many "bits" while it was closed. It's taken a few weeks, but I'm happy to now report that all the excess pieces are gone, our two new looms are installed, and the space is once again ready for networking nights and the weekday weaving group!

And speaking of excess looms, the guild received two separate donations this summer for which the donors asked to have us give their looms to new weavers. I sent an email to all members several weeks ago offering these looms and immediately received a dozen or so responses from members wanting them. Connecting the donors with the new owners was one of the more pleasant duties I've had!

In the upstairs Classroom, the 100-inch loom is assembled and almost ready to begin its first project. We will put a call out for any members interested in participating or finding out more later this fall.

The sale of Natalie's yarns and weaving equipment at the beginning of the month was a huge success. Although the final tally is not yet in, the sale raised about \$7,500. This is in addition to an earlier \$7,500 from the sale of Natalie's looms. Her generous legacy is allowing us to set up a scholarship fund. We will let you know more about it when the policy and criteria for use are established. A huge thanks goes to everyone who volunteered to pack, store, move, set up, sell, and advertise the incredible treasure trove of goods available. Thanks also to all of you who came to shop.

Happy spinning, felting, weaving, etc.! It's such a pleasure being part of this group.

At our November meeting, we will be hosting Diane Taraz from Boston, Massachusetts, who will present "Top to Toe, the Natural History of Clothing".



Diane is a singer-songwriter who loves exploring history through the songs of various eras, including the American Revolution and the Civil War. She performs at museums, historic houses, libraries, and folky events.

Her program on November 1st features *Top to Toe: The Natural History of Clothing* where she explores the hats, shoes, and everything in between that have played an intrinsic role in world cultures.

Through song, Diane shares stories about spinning, weaving, and sewing and how they reflect social issues and cultural movements. Her music offers a glimpse into the lives of former fibre-producers; Indeed, many of the struggles and concerns that shaded the fibre industry of yesteryear echo in our lives today.

Selecting Books:

Members in good standing may request 4 library items for the circulating part of the library. I find browsing the topics/subject list the most helpful when I am looking for something. However, we also have lists by Title, Author, More than 4 harness looms and of course a full list of all the issues of the different magazines we have in the Magazine list (just the title will occur in the subject list so check the magazine list for all the issues). Requesting Books:

After browsing the numerous lists of the library collection please organize your request:

Call number, Title, then Author.

Email your Requested to library@ovwsg.com (this will go to both Jan and Ann).


We will email you back and let you know you have been added to the list of books to pull for this library day. If we have had multiple requests for the same book, or your request is due back the same day you want it, or it is missing from the shelf without permission (we do search to see if it was miss-shelved). We will let you know and may be able to offer an alternative until we can get you your requested items. Remember to let us know if you need to have an alternate pickup option (see below *Optional pickup locations*) or if you need someone else to pick up your books with theirs.

If Multiple members requesting the same book:

Since we have been seeing quite a bit of popularity for the same books, we have started a waiting list for some items. Because of this, it has been useful to have an alternate 5th option when you list your requests in case you have selected one of these very requested titles. We can also sometimes suggest an alternative if one of your books has not yet been returned or has been selected by someone else already (we will add you to the waiting list to get it on another library day).

The Reference section:

Remember REF books are non-circulating and stay in the studio. Before covid they could be viewed in the studio; by appointment or at socials (when space allowed) and before the Monday meetings. Once we have permission from Hartwood house we will set up appointments to come in and use the reference section. We will keep you updated as we get more info. Hartwood house has been more cautious than the provincial guidelines so it may take a bit longer to get to see the reference books. (I am sure they are very lonely and would like to be viewed!)



- 1. Bring a sheet of paper with your NAME printed clearly in BIG letters.
- 2. Go to 404 McArthur Ave. It is across from the Dairy Queen. There is parking on McArthur Ave, in the little plaza at the east end of the building and behind the building.
- 3. Tap on the studio window. (It is the first set of windows after the foyer by the Unitarian door, at the west end of the building.) Hold up your sign so we can read it and match your name to your bag of books.
- 4. Once we have your books in hand, we will meet you at the Unitarian Door just west of the studio window.

Optional pickup locations after November 7th please indicate when you request your books if you need one of the other locations.

- Before November 7 Let the Librarians know at <u>library@ovwsg.com</u> that you want to pick up your books at Heartwood House's front desk. We will email back when your books are ready for pick up. Then you can Email <u>schedule@ovwsg.com</u> to arrange a Pickup day at the Heartwood House front desk. (When you arrive, tell the front desk workers your name and that you have Guild library books to pick up)
- 2. Email <u>library@ovwsg.com</u> West end pick up at 2370 Iris St. (As I write this, the Woodruff end of Iris is closed at the transitway). Or South of Ottawa North Gower 2452 Carsonby Rd. West Ann will give you information.

Heartwood House news

Heartwood House remains in a geographic hotspot. As a result, the front door is to remain locked at this time.

Please remember to continue to follow these COVID-19 safety measures:

- Email Elizabeth Watt <u>schedule@ovwsg.com</u> before attending the studio or classroom at Heartwood House. Elizabeth will administer the COVID health questionnaire and supply HH with the list of visitors.
- Everyone must continue to wear a mask in the hallways and all common areas at all times.
- Studio capacity is limited to 4, classroom capacity is limited to 6 people. Masks must be worn when physical distancing cannot be maintained.
- Anyone attending meetings, workshops, classes, socials, renting equipment, borrowing publications
 or working on OVWSG equipment must use hand sanitizer upon entering, show proof of
 vaccination, and where possible maintain a 2 m distance from other users. (Individuals exempt
 from vaccination for medical reasons must provide a medical exemption certificate signed by a
 physician and a negative COVID-19 test issued within the past 3 days.
- Bathrooms are limited to 1 person at a time.
- Visitors without appointments will be asked to wait in the front foyer until we can reach the member group to confirm the appointment. If we cannot reach you the visitor will be asked to leave.


Please don't use the front entrance unless it is necessary to transport materials into the building. If you are transporting materials into the building and you meet a visitor at the front door, please assist the person to use the intercom to call the front desk.

If you visit Heartwood House through the front entrance, use the intercom to alert staff that you have arrived. Press the black arrow then 100 and wait for reception to pick up, state your name and your purpose, and proceed when the door is unlocked.

Member Book Reviews

Wet Finishing for Weavers, by Laura Fry - DVD DVD738.FRY

This is an excellent DVD. I recently heard someone say (maybe Laura Fry in this DVD) that a piece of woven fabric just off the loom is "just" an interlacement of threads. They unify into cloth during the process of wet finishing. Here is the description of the DVD from the case: "Wet-finishing is the process that turns weaving into cloth. Handwoven threads need water and motion to open them up, flatten them out, move them into place, or shrink them into the fabric that you intend them to be. In this video, professional weaver and teacher Laura Fry shows you how to wet-finish different kinds of fibers and cloth, from the magic that happens in the water through to proper pressing and drying techniques. You'll learn the fulling process for woolen and worsted cloth; how to wetfinish cottons, silks, and rayons; compression techniques to create the smooth, crisp hand of linens; how proper pressing brings out the shine of silk; wet-finishing techniques for differential shrinkage and textured fabrics; and tips and tricks for fringe and other finishing steps. ... By seeing her fabrics before and after wet finishing, you'll understand why Laura says, "It isn't finished until it's wet-finished."



Efficient Weaver Techniques for Fast and Happy Weaving with Laura Fry - DVD DVD734.FRY

This, too, is an excellent DVD. Again, I quote from the DVD case. "While working efficiently depends on personal abilities and disabilities, space, equipment, and budget available, there are many things that one can do to work more ergonomically and efficiently. Whether one is new or more experienced, we can all learn from one another. The most common complaint of weavers is that they don't have enough time for weaving. Production weaver and teacher Laura Fry has an answer: weave more efficiently so you can make the most of the weaving time that you have. In addition to getting more textile for your time at the loom, Laura's techniques and tips will also help you weave better cloth while reducing wear and tear on your body. You'll learn how to warp your loom quickly and accurately; how to achieve correct, consistent tension during warping and weaving; how to thread faster than you've ever imagined; techniques for weaving perfect selvedges; and dozens of ways to make weaving easier on your body.
