President's Message

Greetings OVWSG members! I am truly excited to take over the role of Guild President from Moira White, an incredibly hardworking and resourceful member of the Executive Committee. I want to thank Moira for her dedication and guidance during a very challenging time on so many fronts. Without her steady and thoughtful support, it would have been so much harder for us to navigate these trying times. I am grateful that she is going to be staying on as Chair as she will be an invaluable asset to both me and the Guild.

COVID has changed most of what the Guild does on a daily basis, but kudos to those who found creative ways to keep those activities alive, namely the weekly networking sessions, monthly meetings – especially the programs from places near and far, library resources, rentals, workshops, and study groups. We are now ramping up demos as more community events are coming up due to the easing of COVID restrictions. Can't wait!

For those of you that do not know me, I would like to share a bit of my background. My mother told me that I was fascinated with patterns as a baby and I think that formed my interest in fibre, thread, dyeing and the creation of woven, knitted, and felted structures. diverted my energy, I always kept a loom up and spinning wheel at the ready.

I have been a Guild member for the last 16 years and have participated in many of its activities, including the Sale and Exhibition as a vendor and organizer, the Sheep to Shawl in Carleton Place, demonstrating weaving, spinning, and felting, monthly meeting presenter and tech wiz (ha ha), assisting with grant writing, strategic planning, and 100" loom projects.

Retirement has allowed me to devote almost 100% of my time to my love of all things fibre and I hope to encourage and inspire others to explore and learn through the Guild with all the activities we are planning for the future.

Several members have asked about the 2022 Sale and Exhibition however no firm decisions have been made to date. I will put out a message as soon as information becomes available.

Growing up with a deep love and curiosity for the natural world, she conceived and launched Bloom & Dye along with the Mushroom Color Atlas to grow her work and passion to benefit what she values most: curiosity, education, creativity, collaboration, community, and the environment. For Julie, educating others on how plants, fungi and how their colors reflect the beauty of nature is something she is moved to share as a way to inspire care, stewardship, and impact. Her textile work is bound up in the landscape; every thread is infused with earthly energy as she gently simmers Mother Nature to unlock her colors. Drawing on cultural traditions and ancient natural dye histories each textile object is a record of a place and time, reflecting our relationship to the natural world. For seven years she was on the faculty of Pacific Northwest College of Art and Oregon College of Art & Craft in Portland and is a teacher at Wildcraft Studio School in Portland. When she is not out foraging you can find her tending to her flower farm, working in her art studio, or leading workshops.

COVID RESTRICTIONS

The mask mandate will no longer be in place as of May 30, 2022. The mask signs will be removed from the front door on Monday and the reception staff will no longer ask people to wear a mask. PARKING

As of March 1st we will return to regular checks and ticketing of vehicles that are parked in the back lot with no parking permits.

Please take note of the following parking conditions:

1. Back parking lot:

- The parking area at the Moorvale entrance by the back door entrance and the parking area from the storage pods to the west fence are reserved for permit holders only from Monday to Friday from 8:00a.m. to 4:00p.m.
- Vehicles with no permits on the dashboard will be ticketed.
- There are no parking restrictions in the back lot after 4:00p.m. from Monday to Friday and on Saturday and Sunday.

2. Front lot:

- Visitors parked in the front lot must be registered on the front desk journal.
- A fee of \$1 is charged for parking in the front lot. Please pay at the Heartwood House front desk.



Website and membership renewal, there is something incorrect (on May 1 the security certificate expired) with the website and we are waiting for response from the website host. If you were unable to renew because of this, we will continue to accept you as a member in good standing for voting purposes.

Approval of the minutes from the Last AGM. Laurie Harkin-Chiasson moved to accept, Josee Cochrane seconded; Approved.

Year End Report

Year End Report is not currently available, but it will get to members soon. Verbal update provided as below.

Membership - 198 Active membership (167 individual, 15 family). April is a busy month for renewal. Thank you to all who has renewed. Still 36 outstanding. Reminder email will be sent to those outstanding once the website is back up and running.

Workshops – majority cancelled due to COVID restrictions. Continued with a few study groups. Elizabeth update – fall – managed 6 weeks of workshop before Omicron wave hit. Highlight of the year - Virtual workshop in beginning spindle spinning for high school students was given in January and was well received. Spindles were picked up by the teacher to enable the class.

Looking for additional input on how people are feeling and where they want workshops to go. May send out a survey if executive approves.

Ruth C. believes we should bring in outside teachers to offer virtual courses.

Programs – Thank you to the Program Team Liane, Joan, Josée for the quality presentations and programs that we had this year.

Library – 6 regular members, 3 volunteer

69 acquisitions.

Update on circulation and over 250 hours put in by the librarians.

Socials – Thank you to Ann McElroy for continuing the virtual socials.

Rentals – Loom - only one loom rented at the moment; rentals have been going well. Loom rental coordinator has enjoyed working from home, will likely encourage this to continue.

- Spinning rentals – 1 wheel out at the moment; continual turn over of rentals, not some much interest in the e-spinners but would like to update the website to highlight the new equipment; much easier dealing with it from home also, will likely encourage it to continue.

Website - Thank you to Judy K. for taking care of the website.

Grants – grant application to City was submitted. City is back on a one-year cycle. City has given up \$5,500 to hold us over until July.

Donations – Continuing to come in though no physical space to hold them, so we have been selling them.

Newsletter – Brenda has done a great job on Penelope's news with little fuss.

Financial update – we are getting caught up in our books. When the current Treasurer resigns next year, the books should be caught up. Explanation of financial report.

Financial loss of \$15,000 this year. We started the year in a \$7,000 deficit. Rental equipment has stayed the same. The funds that we did take in were largely from previous Chair Natalie's posthumous donation. Grants included under "uncategorized income" in balance sheet. We need to ask the bookkeeper to amend the category to show grant money under "Public funds".

We need to research to possibility of getting Charitable status for the guild. We applied about 10 years ago and were refused because they felt that the EX and Sale was an income generator for the guild. We will need to find a new way to describe this aspect of the guild. The board will look into this over the next year or so.

Chair is turned to Mandy for the election of the Board of Directors.

Board of Directors Election:

Each position elected for 2 years, eligible for one additional term. 5 regular members plus 2 positions appointed by the board at the first board meeting.
