Updates from Program Coordinators

Programs

Our guest speaker for the March meeting, Sharon Kallis, is a community engaged environmental artist and committed life-long learner. At home on the west coast of Canada, she is the founding executive director of EartHand Gleaners Society. Sharon has worked extensively with the Vancouver Park Board since 2008 and is the primary steward for two urban learning gardens where materials for creative production are grown.

Learning while teaching – Sharon partners with ecologists, gardeners, and makers with an interest in linking traditional hand technologies to what we can grow, gather, and glean in our urban green spaces. Traditional textiles are at the core of the work, growing stinging nettle and flax for linen in city parks since 2012.

Sharon is doing her own cultural work through cloth and is working to be a better ancestor while living as an uninvited guest on the unceded land of the $S\underline{k}w\underline{x}w\dot{u}7mesh$, $Se\dot{l}lweta?/Selilwitulh$ and $x^wme\theta k^we\dot{u}em$ nations. The title of her presentation is: "An artist's quest for the home-grown 'power suit'."

At the April meeting, our guest speaker will be Wendo van Essen, fibre artist, amazing felter, and a member of our guild. We're very excited to have Wendo present to us!

Library

After the Book count is complete, I will be working on making new updated lists. This seems to be taking longer than anticipated so we appreciate your patients while we work.

As you browse through the above lists, you may notice the depth and scope of our library is impressive. We have one of the best guild libraries in the country. Non-Members are welcome to come in and read or do research with us but are not allowed to take out books.

WHY: The Library is a source of Inspiration and education. Whether you want to deeply research the history of the overshot coverlet or brows at pictures in one of the magazines, the library is here to help you in your fiber journey. I started as a weaver, got distracted into spinning, tried, and enjoyed Basketry then wound up discovering not all felting is wet! You may not wonder quite so much through the topics but if you do, the library is waiting to enlighten you. Equipment Rentals

Inkle Weaving

Have you ever tried weaving on an inkle loom? This unusual loom is specifically intended to use in the making of bands – long bands, short bands, skinny bands, and wide bands. You can make bag straps, guitar straps, belts, cat collars!! and more. It is fascinating to watch the huge variety of patterns that one can create, enhanced with delightful colour play.

The Guild has two charming inklettes (among other inkle looms) that are available for rent. They are small enough to comfortably use on your lap, in the car, or while visiting (think knitting, and then think again...). The library has perhaps a dozen books that explore inkle weaving to get you started. Contact rentals@ovwsg.com for more information or to arrange a rental.

Workshops

Workshops are going well, with most currently scheduled workshops full or nearly full. We had to remove some "under construction" workshops because construction was delayed but I am hopeful they will return in some form soon. Please keep your ideas for workshops coming, but remember that our focus is spinning, weaving, and felting. We do some workshops in related fields like basketry and dyeing, but generally we don't go into areas like knitting, crochet, lacemaking nor embroidery unless it is specifically for application to handspun or handwoven materials.

The team is about to embark on the next scheduling round. We will continue with scheduling in smaller chunks for the rest of this year. The next round will cover May through August. We are always open to new teachers. We do have a policy and procedure in place for vetting new instructors, we look at teaching experience (not necessarily in fibre arts, but experience in teaching adults is an asset) and level of expertise in the topic you wish to present. If you have expertise in a topic, but lack teaching experience we can help you with that, you can shadow a current instructor of a similar topic or we can find you a mentor to help with lesson planning (some days I reach out for that still as I tend to bite off more than I can chew (ask about my rather disastrous attempt at shoving 4 advanced topics into a 2 day rigid heddle workshop...)). 4. Sunday Parking:


 Please park in front of the building or to the East of the Laundry in the rear parking lot (areas are marked in yellow below) to allow Unitarians access to their space on Sundays.

Member Book Reviews

The Cotton Commentary

Spinning Cotton, with Stephanie Gaustad - DVD 641.31GAU

This DVD from our library collection is awesome – if you are into cotton spinning. I will simply quote the insert that accompanies the DVD, as that is concise and complete:

Cotton was perhaps the most important fiber of the ancient world, clothing more people throughout history than any other. It remains one of the most important fibers today – think underwear and bluejeans! Sheets and towels! Yet cotton has been largely neglected by contemporary spinners in the developed world. Stephanie Gaustad aims to change all that. In this engaging video, you'll learn: How to prepare cotton, from boll to batt; how to spin cotton with ease and efficiency on a wide range of tools, from tahkli to flyer wheel; how to boil off and set twist in preparation for weaving, knitting, or what have you. Along the way, you'll be treated to fascinating historical asides, to inventive tricks for devising and adapting tools, and to an array of splendid made goods from socks to smock to household cloths. This is an excellent DVD.

If The History of Cotton is more your thing, there is a collection of videos Titled, "The Rise and Fall of King Cotton". King cotton was the label given to American cotton during the heyday of the cotton industry, and this thumb drive contains several videos that focus on that.

A third volume that I have checked out is labelled "Assorted Hand-spinning Cotton. This includes instructional spinning from a variety of cultures, making it an interesting accompaniment to Gaustad's DVD.


