100-inch Loom – Tablecloth Project Complete!

21 yards of cotton warp were wound onto our sectional beam of the 100" loom early this year for six tablecloths. It took about 12-13 hours. Then 2128 individual ends were threaded through the heddles for a shadow weave twill design, another 23 hours. Using a 12-inch reed we sleyed at 28 epi and tied the ends onto the front beam rod – about 5 more hours. Then we started to weave!!!

The five of us all used a fine linen (30/2) for the weft and we wove in pairs to complete each tablecloth. The linen weft colours varied from natural linen to two shades of blue to one shade of blue. It took an average of 18-20 hours to weave each cloth, with the length varying in each piece to fit different individual table sizes.

In the end we had six tablecloths and about 1.4



yards of usable warp left. We unrolled and cut the heavy woven cloth into individual tablecloths. Each were taken home to secure the edges, wash, dry, iron and hem them.





If you add all the people's hours of work on this project, with every one hour of weaving equaling two hours (since two people wove at a time and threading and warping on required two at a time, etc.), it required about **310 hours** of time for this project, excluding washing and finishing of the hems.

All in all, it was a fun project and worth our time!

100-inch Loom – Next Project

Hi everyone: Our new **LeClerc** *Kebec* **100-inch loom's cloth beam** has just been unrolled with our completed six cotton/linen tablecloths! Now, we are ready to plan and prepare our next project – **wool blankets**!! Several newer weavers are interested in trying the loom and wool blankets would be a gentle introduction to this big loom.



We weave the blankets the width of the loom (100") and generally the same dimensions in length. That way, each blanket will fit nicely on a double or queen-sized bed. The wool warp will cost *roughly around* \$140.00 per weaver. This will vary depending on the size of our order. The weft cost will vary also, depending on the mill brand or hand spun wool each weaver uses.

To participate on the 100-inch loom, we ask that each weaver has taken the basic Beginner Weaving Workshop – each weaver needs to be comfortable with assisting with dressing of the loom, treadling, reading drafts and throwing shuttles. Weavers will be working in pairs on the loom, so there is lots to discuss.





The Quest for the Orange Book!



In the very early part of the 1990's, Glenn and I took a trip to New York City. We visited a friend who had moved there and we all trekked out to The Met Cloisters. The Cloisters houses most of the medieval collection from the MET and is situated in what we were told is Harlem, between the Hudson River and apartment blocks. We had a wonderful day wandering through the collection. I even found an ivory diptych I had studied at university. It was so much smaller than what I had seen projected on the wall as we studied it.


While there, I of course checked out the cloister gift shop. I was ecstatic to find 2 copies of the best English book on Viking weaving and textiles and one I had hoped to add to my own collection. They were each \$20.00 USD. I debated getting both of them, but didn't want to buy a book for the Guild library that would only have been of interest to about 3 or 4, out of the 80 members we had at the time. So, I only bought the one, and have regretted it for years since.



Quite a few years later, I found a copy of a book on Anglo-Saxon weaving and textiles. I debated again but this time, knew by watching the interest listed on membership forms, more members wanted information about historical weaving and textiles. I added it to circulation and there was quite a bit of interest expressed. It went out once, returned, then at the next meeting it disappeared. I had lost hope ever seeing it again. In November, Glenn went to the local SCA event to sell a few of his books and took a note for me, asking for help, saying that I was looking for a copy of the orange book, *The Warp Weighted Loom by Marta Hoffman*. It has been out of print for decades and I have been unable to find a second-hand copy.

One of our former Guild members was also there, and told Glenn he had a copy that he didn't need. If you were a Guild member in the 1980's and very early 1990's you may remember Henry Troup and his wife, Jennifer Bulman. He has gifted his copy to the Guild library. Unlike my now long loved copy, which is well worn, pencil underlined text, with notes in the margins, and falling apart, this one is in very good shape.

Henry and Jennifer were also the ones who told me about the Guild and the reason I went to my first meeting. It was the AGM where I volunteered to "help with the library" and was told I would be the librarian. I did warn them about that dyslexic and




dyscalculia problem, but was told it was fine. (I don't think anyone knew what those words meant but they did find out. Ask me sometime about the subject catalogue incident.)

When I rebuilt the architecture, Modified Dui decimal, to fit our specialized collection of fiber arts books, I left a spot for this book, just in case I ever found it, or the Guild inherited my beaten-up copy. 719.1 -Warp Weighted loom. The 710.'s is Weaving Equipment (looms), the 9 suggests history or historical, the .1 is the first type of historical loom in this category. It is going into reference but it is worth coming in and enjoying it.

I hope you are as excited as I am to finally be able to add this one to our collection. Jan

The bobbin spindle is tapered, from 4.5 > 8 mm.



Custom-Sized Raddle

The maximum length is 21.5". If you would like a smaller length than this, it can be cut to suit.







Tension Box - \$175

This is a tool that measures the length of the warp threads as you wind them onto the loom. It is usually used with a sectional back beam, allowing multiple threads to be wound from multiple cones/cores at the same time.

This is a single treadle, castle style wheel, with three bobbins.

This is a castle wheel with one bobbin, single treadle, in excellent condition.



Venetian Blind Slats

These make excellent separators on the warping beam, while winding the warp, instead of paper. And they are thinner than wooden sticks, with a slight curve that fits the rounded beam very nicely. They are approximately 36" long, and can be cut easily.

Heartwood House Access + Parking

Getting into the Studio:

Before 6 pm – Heartwood House may be open – come in the front door, sign in at the office desk (this helps with HH's Grants) and then go past the elevator through the door, turn right and proceed down the hall to the last door on the right, labelled OVWSG Studio.

After 6 pm – the studio window is the first window east of the Unitarian Foyer/Art Gallery. Tap on the window and if someone is there, they can let you in the Unitarian door (across from the Dairy Queen).

Parking

1. Back parking lot:

- The parking area at the Moorvale entrance by the back door entrance and the parking area from the storage pods to the west fence are reserved for permit holders only from Monday to Friday from 8:00a.m. to 4:00p.m.

Maple Cookies

Recipe from Martha Stewart
Makes about 8 dozen cookies

Ingredients

- 3 cups (375g) all-purpose flour, plus more for surface
- ½ tsp salt
- 8 ounces (1 cup/216g) unsalted butter
- ½ cup (100g) granulated sugar
- ½ cup (110g) brown sugar
- 1 large egg yolk
- ¾ cup (245g) pure maple syrup, divided
- Vegetable oil cooking spray
- 1/3 cup (75g) sanding sugar

Instructions

Step 1

Sift flour and salt into a medium bowl. Beat butter and granulated and brown sugars with a mixer on medium-high speed until pale and creamy, about 3 minutes. Reduce speed to medium-low, and add yolk, then ½ cup (163g) maple syrup, beating well after each addition. Add flour mixture, and beat until just incorporated. Shape into 2 disks, wrap each in plastic, and refrigerate for at least 2 hours (or up to 2 days).

Step 2

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. Roll out 1 disk of dough to ¼-inch thickness on a sheet of lightly floured parchment. Place parchment with dough on baking sheet. Freeze until firm, about 15 minutes.

Step 3

Coat baking sheets with cooking spray, line with parchment, and coat parchment. Cut out cookies from frozen dough using a 3 ½-inch maple-leaf-shaped cutter, and space 1 inch apart on sheets. Roll and cut scraps once. Freeze cookies until firm, about 15 minutes.

Step 4

Bake cookies until edges begin to turn golden, 14 to 16 minutes. Transfer parchment with cookies to wire racks, and let cool for 5 minutes. Brush cookies with 2 tablespoons (41g) maple syrup, and sprinkle with ½ the sanding sugar. Let cool. Repeat with remaining dough, maple syrup, and sugar.

Baker's Notes

Be sure to use pure maple syrup, not a lesser imitation.

Cookies will keep for up to 2 days at room temperature, months if frozen, and they're still delicious!! (Try to enjoy one after it has defrosted though... if you can wait! Lol)
