As you know, OCTranspo is no longer using HH as its Lost and Found depot. They will however be sending their abandoned goods to them for sale. Programs



E-textile hand-spinning workshops at the Kingston HW&S Guild, where individuals spun their own conductive yarns and attached them to small computers to make interactive systems that played music notes or sounds

Our guest presenter February 3 (via Zoom) will be e-textile researcher Lee Jones. Lee will introduce attendees to the field of electronic textiles (also known as e-textiles) and Conductive Materials for Spinning E-textile Yarns

Handspun E-textile Yarns

discuss insights from her recent research project on hand spinning e-textile yarns. E-textiles and having electronics embedded in fibres and fabrics might sound like science-fiction but is actually a fun and easy way to learn all about electricity and physical computing. Spinning e-textile yarns, rather than purchasing them, enables individuals to leverage local fibres, blend them with conductive materials, and create customised yarns that can blend technology into their textile projects. Lee will discuss insights from her interviews with spinners across Canada, and e-textile spinning workshops with the Kingston Handloom Weavers & Spinners Guild. Attendees will come away from this talk with an understanding of how technology can be combined with spinning and weaving practices.





Rognvaldson Wheels for Sale



I am selling two of my flock, both are Rognvaldson although only one is signed.

#1 – The first is made of oak, dated and signed G.R. Rognvaldson
1977. There is some damage to one of the three included bobbins.
There are two wires remaining in the built in lazy kate. I have used
both of these for a short while and do not in all fairness need three of
these wheels. The oak is a good solid wheel for spinning. And I

would really like to see her used more. I'm asking 350.00 for the oak wheel.

#2 – The other wheel is made of maple, but does not have a Rognvaldson mark. It is stamped with No47 on the underside, but it has all the hallmarks of a Rognvaldson wheel. It has only one bobbin. This shortfall is reflected in the sale price of \$200.00.

This is a tool that measures the length of the warp threads as you wind them onto the loom. It is usually used with a sectional back beam, allowing multiple threads to be wound from multiple cones/cores at the same time.

Photos for the package, also emergency contact information, included in the package? At this point 265 paid members. What quantity is the quantity we want for membership? Tracking membership turnover, and why people are not renewing? We are on a good path.

Work plan, wishes and budgets for the year

What each committee needs financially, and organizationally from the Executive

- Ruth 100-inch loom, technical measurements and technicalities for the in-depth study. Could we have handwoven labels "made by the Ottawa valley guild" by Dutch Label? Send label info to Carl. Jan wants a binder with info of the projects coming off the 100-inch loom. The great wheel – 1856 of the Kitchener area, we were to have as long as we could use for teaching. Fanshaw museum in London or the museum close to where this wheel was made are options for placement. A German immigrant who was a wheel rite built the wheel.
- Newsletter no links for advertising. Cleaning up the archive. Need guidance around clean-up. Lag of six months or a year of posting the newsletter, it is a membership benefit. Some copies mailed, once a month. Being mindful of personal information. May need some help. Could create a form for advertising?

- 3. Membership do not need anything currently. Lost eight months membership fees during the lapse in membership, need a year for consultation and come back with proposals?
- 4. Programs allocated an \$800 budget for bringing in speakers. Spent Jan-Dec 2024 -\$500, Oct/Nov -\$250. Based on the survey, we want to bring in our external speakers, but we want to bring in our members as well, maybe adding a bit of time at the end of the meeting to get to know each other. We need to make sure to connect with everyone. Need a year under our belt to experience the position. Was \$50/member or \$100 non member for speakers. Trying to be responsive to the survey. Interesting programs for the budget that we have.
- Workshops support wise, Ann and Barbara are supporting evaluations. Paper forms will be able to scan. Web is 99%, challenges to be solved. Registration is under control. Need a conversation about cheques. Will be on the agenda for the next executive meeting.

We only have so many instructors. We are bringing on new instructors. Curriculum is sorted but spinning curriculum needs to be agreed on. Need to create a document for new instructors? Ensure instructor has teaching skills. Recruitment? Other guilds could share as well.

- Sale and Ex need some money from this year's sale to start off next years sale. It changes from year to year, seed money for business cards \$358.00 (2024). Since digital advertising virtually no expenses. Instagram - \$188.00 (2024). Operationally anything more? Need one member of the executive to be a member of the committee.
- 7. Demos need new samples that relate to everyday life, need business cards, need information about the workshops in a document form, need to have activities where we can engage with the public, access to computer information, participants with the demos, etc. Invitation to the demo.com, but everything is going from my personal e-mail. Budget less than \$50.00. Most important is the business cards. Be nice to have a demo assistant, need some help.
- Studio equipment assistants, Sylvie and Wendy. Big project put heddles on the tabletop looms. Sylvie, budgeting – Louie Bouchet is a wood turner (Gatineau) to fix looms. Spinning wheel go to Gord, Judy or Al. Remind people that we have clip boards in the classroom and studio, please document on the clip board any loom problems. Budget is on an as need basis.

Make sure everything is ready for the instructors, any supplies. We need to budget for the Studio. Also have a clip board for supplies. Cleaner, on an as need basis as well as the OHS in depth study representative. Could do a program next year.

- 9. Weaving rental co-ordinator inventory of equipment, 15 Dorothy looms as a guild but in the meantime we had received some more. Wabi Sabi has ordered 2 parts for this extra Dorothy loom, \$30/each. Louise's husband created a new part for the Ashford wheel missing part. Maybe we should have a budget for repairs?
- Library running on no budget and magazines. Need to be paid for the book bought during Covid, \$75.00. Looking at Australian or British magazines.
 Budget separate -magazines/books. I buy the tape, etc. Operationally- things moving around, but need budget for tape, cards in pockets.
- 11. Technical Systems do not have a budget, we have always received our web posting for free. Expenses occasionally updates for handling plug-ins and events for workshops. Operationally, Elizabeth wants to learn more about it, and someone else volunteered. People don't send updates. General information on the website about the guild not up to date.
- Constitution and Bylaws need a successor. No expenses, but advice was to change to provincial from federal. Result would have been \$5-6000 in savings. Will check into changes since and reevaluate viability to switch

Sweet Farewell (until next time...)

This is a favourite quick and deliciously tender cake you can get into the oven in about 5-10 minutes (I'm not kidding!). Originally, it was mixed right in the pan for even less clean-up. There are vanilla, spice and gluten-free [GF] variations on the King Arthur website so you can switch this up when you like [link below]. I have made this GF by substituting my favourite GF flour, Bob's Red Mill 1 to 1 Baking Flour.

Original Cake Pan Cake

Ingredients

Cake

- 1 ½ cups (180g) All-Purpose Flour
- 1 cup (198g) granulated sugar
- ¼ cup (21g) unsweetened cocoa, Dutch-process or natural*
- ½ teaspoon table salt
- 1/2 teaspoon espresso powder, optional*
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract
- 1 tablespoon (14g) cider vinegar or white vinegar
- 1/3 cup (67g) vegetable oil
- 1 cup (227g) water, cold

Icing

- 1 ½ cups (255g) semisweet chocolate chips
- ½ cup (113g) half-and-half



*Baker's Notes:

- Natural cocoa lends robust chocolate flavor and a slightly reddish hue; Dutch-process cocoa is milder in flavor.
- Adding espresso powder won't make the cake taste like coffee but it will enhance the chocolate flavour so the cake tastes more chocolatey.
- For a richer cake, I like to substitute milk for the water. You can use any milk you have on hand, including plantbased.
- You can make this cake gluten-free by substituting your favourite gluten-free flour. I like Bob's Red Mill 1 to 1 Baking Flour.

Instructions

- 1. Preheat your oven to 350°F. Lightly grease an 8" square or 9" round pan that's at least 2" deep.
- 2. Whisk the dry ingredients together in a medium-sized bowl. Whisk the vanilla, vinegar, vegetable oil, and water in a separate bowl. Pour the wet ingredients into the bowl of dry ingredients, stirring until thoroughly combined. Pour the batter into the prepared pan.
- 3. Bake the cake for 30 to 35 minutes, until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean, or with a few moist crumbs clinging to it.
- 4. Serve the cake right from the pan; warm from the oven, it's wonderful with a big glass of milk.
- 5. Or, once cool, frost the cake with this simple chocolate frosting: Heat the chocolate chips with the half-and-half until the chips melt. Stir until smooth, and pour/spread over the cake. For a non-dairy icing, substitute 1/3 cup cold brewed coffee (or water) for the half-and-half.
- 6. Store cake, well covered, at room temperature for several days; freeze for longer storage.
