Updates from Coordinators

Programs

Do you know the difference between a check pattern, a plaid and a tartan? Ever wonder if you could design your own family tartan and have it registered with the Scottish Register of Tartans (formerly known as the Scottish Tartan Authority)?

We be talking all things tartan on March 3rd when we welcome master kilt-maker Shirley Stapley to our guild meeting. Last year, the oldest "true tartan" ever found, dating back to the 1500-1600s, which was incredibly well-preserved in a peat bog, was recreated by textile



designers and tartan experts (see picture to the right). Read more about this fascinating ancient fabric <u>here</u> and join us on March 3rd wearing your colours!

Shirley Stapley is Canadian with Scottish and Irish family heritage. She studied in Edinburgh Scotland kiltmaking for two summers, to complete her studies in advanced kiltmaking.

Shirley started her business after an injury forced her to seek out a new hobby during the start of Covid. Since then, Shirley has had many new kilts orders, and kilt alterations to keep her busy. During that time, she took on friends Julie and her husband Tony as apprentice and business manager. The company Marshall Bespoke Kiltmakers was then open to more orders, for pipe bands, Free Mason groups, wedding groups, and private individuals. The business supplies hand stitched kilts and full Highland gear and accessories. The business is a home based in Ottawa and surrounding regions in Ontario and Quebec. Marshall kilts are vendors at the Glengarry Highland Games in Maxville Ontario as well as vendors at the Almonte Highland Games. We were the first kilt company to show our kilts at the Ottawa Wedding Spring and Fall shows. Shirley and Julie have presented kilt making demonstrations for The Ottawa Scottish Society, and offered beginner classes in full kiltmaking and pleating courses. Shirley and her husband David, returned to Scotland a few years back to tour the highlands and show Julie and Tony the proud Scottish history, sites and a visit to the mills in The Borders of Scotland.

This short talk to the Ottawa Valley Weavers' and Spinners Guild will focus on the history of tartan, and how tartan is woven in the old and new tech. mills. The discussion will also touch on the new direction of tartan pattern weaving and styles and how that is impacting the mills and the fashion industry worldwide.

Sale & Exhibition 2025

It is time to start thinking about the Guild Sale and Exhibition again. This is our annual sale, held in early November, where members can rent a booth and sell their items. Our focus is on handmade items and this can include: fiber you raise or process, hand spun or hand dyed yarn, weaving, felt or baskets. We also have a Co-op Booth that you can sell in if you only have a few items. Any sales at the Co-op Booth pay a commission to the Guild which contributes to the space rental for the booth.

So that our quality remains high all vendors are juried, including vendors in the Co-op Booth. The jury process is easy and geared towards getting you ready to sell your items.

Booths are first offered to returning vendors starting March 1. These vendors have until May 1 to claim their space. After May 1 we open up the remaining booths to new vendors. We have several sizes of booths to suit different needs, with some booths shared by multiple vendors.

Each year the sale also hosts an exhibition that showcases our guild members' work. There will be a theme for the exhibition (still being worked out). The Exhibition committee will be giving more information soon.





Spinning Wheel* - needs TLC - \$35





Tension Box–\$125 \$175 This is a tool that measures the length of the warp threads as you wind them onto the loom. It is usually used with a sectional back beam, allowing multiple threads to be wound from multiple cones/cores at the same time.


These make excellent separators on the warping beam, while winding the warp, instead of paper. And they are thinner than wooden sticks, with a slight curve that fits the rounded beam very nicely. They are approximately 36" long, and can be cut easily.

Table Loom – \$100

In need of some care, including cleaning, lubricating, and adjustments. It comes with a reed, a new apron still in the packaging and four new apron bars. A sley hook can be included if desired.







Good shape, solid build, and strong teeth.



The cloth is in poor shape and one of the two handles needs a bit of reinforcement. Two small nails will do it.



We don't know what it is. "If you know, you can have it!"





Two-sided Inkle or Tablet loom – \$20

This is an odd configuration, but very useful if you have a tendency to want to weave wider than standard pieces. The two sides support the frame in a way that a standard inkle loom does not.

Louet 28-inch table loom – SOLD!



\$75

This comes with a box of extra heddles, and possibly other surprises. Also includes wooden warping sticks, and wooden lease sticks. Note that the heddles are plastic. Also be aware that this loom needs cleaning, but not as extensive as the 22" Leclerc. The original price indicated on this loom was \$275 by the original/last owner.

Leclerc 22-inch table loom – FREE – GONE!



This loom is in rough condition and is missing some parts. It is worth the TLC, especially if you like giving TLC to equipment that would benefit. Free to the first taker.

Warping Board – SOLD! \$25

This is homemade but with solid wood. It needs a light cleaning. Note that there is a crack at one corner that can easily be fixed with "No More Nails" or wood glue.

Welcome Check-in, Introductions, call to order

Finalize Agenda Addition, add Ruth (100-inch loom) after the approval of the minutes.

Approve November, December, Executive Meeting Minutes

November 18th, 2024, Executive Meeting minutes approved, Carl motioned, Deb seconded. December 16^{th,} 2024, Executive Meeting minutes approved, Deb motioned, Jean seconded.

Reed for 100 Inch Loom

The next project for the 100-inch loom is wool blankets using Briggs and Little wool from New Brunswick. The yarn requires an 8-dent reed. The guild does not have an 8-dent reed for the 100-inch loom. The cost of the 8-dent reed is \$616.00 plus shipping \$265.00 x 14.975% tax=\$1012.93 in total. Carl moved to purchase the 8-dent reed, and Jean seconded. Ruth will go ahead with the order.

Chair Update

The guild application for the city grant is going well. It is due Wednesday. Jean to assist on Tuesday.

President Update

The demo room is vacant and removed from the guild's rent.

The classroom telephone is still not working. Louise is working with Mo from Heartwood House on this issue. The photocopier needs to be replaced, Jean to research, usage, what is printed, what we need as a guild. **Financial Update**

Sent from Louise prior to meeting:

Treasurer's Report,

1. Our current balance (PayPal, and bank accounts) is \$43,874.

- 2. I have spent many hours over the last few weeks catching up on bookkeeping activities. All accounts are now up to date and reconciled up to the end of November. I will complete December when I return and then turn the files over to the bookkeeper so that she can prepare the HST return.
- 3. I had to create a new Square account. Square has a requirement to update owner information, and they don't recognize me as an owner. It required only an email from Beth Briggs, the previous owner to request the change, but after several unanswered requests to her, I opted to just move forward and create a new account. It still connects with our device, so there is no cost associated with the change.
- 4. The Heartwood House rental invoice for January reflects the removal of the storage room at the entrance (\$132.61 plus tax). This results in an annualized savings of \$1591 plus tax.

Review of Job Positions/Titles

Further to discussion of the November meeting, perhaps workshop chair be the scheduler, with a second person to recruit and liaison with new instructors.

Need to update positions and titles to reflect current roles and responsibilities, such as Deborah's studio duties.

Review of Library and Workshop Resources

- Library to have a wish list of books for purchase with the rational by April 30th of each year. As well a list of books to be removed and DE acquisitioned each year. We do not de-acquisition.
- 2. If books are donated, a note should be published in the newsletter with a thank you.
- 3. Library archivist could be an interesting speaker option for the membership; What function does our library do? Auxiliary library, questions? Need to bring to membership for discussion.
- 4. Workshops- building instructors, recruiting instructors, conflict of interest, more discussion needed. Will reach out to Workshops reminding of discussion of November meeting and next steps.

Policies to be resent out for examination and quick discussion for goals and criteria; to follow prior to next meeting. We will invite the library/workshops? To be determined?

Facebook's Change to it's DEI (Diversity, Equity and Inclusion) policy

Facebook has rescinded it's DEI policy. How does this affect the guild? Do we want to continue the guild Facebook page? Some of our members are opting out, others never were in, where do we go from here? We will post articles regarding this move by Facebook in the newsletter and bring it to discussion at the guild meeting.

Ann Sunahara has books for sale with proceeds to go to the guild. She will have books set-up on the guild tables at the next meeting. Ann will also be giving back to the guild a Fibre works program that the guild gifted to Anne. Anne also has a scanner to give away, she will forward a photo.

Heartwood House Access + Parking

Getting into the Studio:

Before 6 pm – Heartwood House may be open – come in the front door, sign in at the office desk (this helps with HH's Grants) and then go past the elevator through the door, turn right and proceed down the hall to the last door on the right, labelled OVWSG Studio.

Parking

1. Back parking lot:

- The parking area at the Moorvale entrance by the back door entrance and the parking area from the storage pods to the west fence are reserved for permit holders only from Monday to Friday from 8:00a.m. to 4:00p.m.

- Visitors who are popping in to drop off an item to a member are not required to pay a fee or register the vehicle.
- 3. UUFO entrance:
 - The two spots in front of the Unitarian entrance are reserved for the Unitarian members.
- 4. Sunday Parking:
 - Please park in front of the building or to the East of the Laundry in the rear parking lot (areas are marked in yellow below) to allow Unitarians access to their space on Sundays.

Sweet Farewell (until next time...)

I thought it was time for a bread recipe! This is a favourite soft bun that can be used as dinner rolls or burger buns. I have been known to start mixing the dough early in the afternoon (like 1 or 2 pm) and have freshly made buns ready for dinner at 6 pm. Truly. These are delish and a staple at my church's take-out meals, where I produce usually around 150-180 of them in a morning (I do have a 2 additional helpers for that). Enjoy! Lianne

Super Soft Buns

Recipe from Cloudy Kitchen Makes 12-14 buns

Ingredients

Tangzhong

- 25g bread flour
- 120g whole milk

Burger Bun Dough

- All of the Tangzhong
- 200g cold milk
- 20g granulated sugar
- 2 tsp (7g) instant yeast
- 30g milk powder
- 1 ½ tsp (7g) kosher salt
- 1 egg, at room temperature
- 360g bread flour
- 45g unsalted butter, at room temperature
- Egg wash 1 egg whisked with 1 Tbsp water

Instructions

TANGZHONG

 Combine the milk and bread flour in a medium saucepan. Place over medium heat and cook, stirring continuously, until the mixture thickens into a paste. Remove from heat and transfer to the bowl of a stand mixer.



BUN DOUGH

- 1. Add the cold milk and mix to combine, checking with your finger that it is not hotter than lukewarm (the cold milk should cool the hot tangzhong enough). Add the sugar, yeast, milk powder, salt, egg, and flour. Transfer to the mixer and fit with the dough hook.
- 2. Mix the dough on medium speed until it is smooth and elastic and clearing the sides of the bowl, about 12-15 minutes. Don't freak out, as it is sticky if you have made it by weight you will be fine. Set a timer and walk away from the mixer if you need. If after that time it really isn't coming together and you're worried, add flour a teaspoon at a time just until the dough just comes together.
- 3. Add the butter and mix for a further 5 minutes until incorporated. The dough should be smooth and elastic, and pass the windowpane test.
- 4. Turn the dough out onto a surface and flour very lightly if needed to bring into a tight ball with a bench scraper. Transfer to a greased bowl and cover the bowl with plastic wrap.
- 5. Place the dough in a warm spot and rise until doubled in size, approximately 1 hour.
- 6. Turn the dough out onto a lightly floured surface.
- 7. Divide the dough into 12 to 14 equal portions, each weighing about 65g. Working with one piece of dough at a time, flatten out the piece of dough, then tuck up into a ball, then turn the ball seam side down and roll into a tight ball by cupping your hand to create a 'claw' shape, using the tension from the counter to roll the dough tightly.
- 8. Place them spaced apart on baking sheets. They rise quite a lot so ensure they are far enough apart.
- 9. Cover the buns with some lightly greased plastic wrap. Leave the buns to rise again for about 1 hour. You want them to puff up and double in size, and when you press lightly on one, it should leave a small indentation that doesn't quite spring back. Remember that rising time depends on your environment so go by how the dough is looking, rather than a rising time.
- 10. When there is about 20 minutes to go in the rise, preheat the oven to 360°F. Carefully brush the buns with egg wash. Bake in the oven for 15-18 minutes, until they are a deep golden brown.
- 11. Remove from the oven and leave to cool on the pans for 10-15 minutes then transfer to a wire rack and allow to cool completely. The buns will wrinkle slightly as they cool this is due to them being very soft and is totally normal.

Store leftovers in an airtight container at room temperature – they should stay soft for at least 5 days. These can also be frozen. After the first day or two, toast the buns if needed.
